

#### B'NEINU (BETWEEN US)

Is this Passover holiday different from all other Passover holidays?

The most often asked question about Passover is not one of the Four Questions asked at the seder. A ruling (*Teshuva*) of the Committee on Jewish Law and Standards a few years ago allowed *kitniyot* (legumes, rice and corn) to be consumed during Passover. However...

Before you change your holiday food shopping list, here are some of the arguments presented in the teshuva and in the dissenting opinion which must also be considered in making a decision. When making such decisions (such as whether or not to consume kitniyot during Pesach), a Jew is supposed to check with their local Rabbi (mara d'atra). Do NOT consider this article a final determination. Rather, please check with me if you want to know if it is permissible or not.



The rabbis of the Mishnah period ruled that only five species of grains, including wheat and barley, may be used to bake matzah. When mixed with water, they ferment and become *chametz*. They also ruled that since sesame seeds and rice do not ferment but rather decay, they may be eaten. ¹Rabbi Yochanan ben Nuri was the only rabbi of the period to said that rice is a type of grain that can become chametz; thereby forbidding its consumption during Pesach.

Rabbis of the Talmud asked what cooked dishes mentioned in the Mishnah are to be served at the seder? <sup>2</sup>Rav Huna said: beets and rice. <sup>3</sup>Rava served it since it came out of the mouth of Rav Huna. <sup>4</sup>Rav Ashi said: learn from Rav Huna; no one follows the opinion of Rabbi Yochanan ben Nuri.

Later rabbis of the early middle ages, mostly in Europe, agreed on the five grains that could become chametz. 5 Maimonides: "kitniyot such as rice, millet, beans, lentils, and the like cannot become chametz."

The prohibition, or more accurately, the custom

to not eating *kitniyot* and rice on Passover is first mentioned in France in the 13th century. The custom spread without one unifying reason. The *teshuva* mentions there being at least 10 different explanations, most of which point to it being "a mistaken" or "foolish" custom.

An overlying question now becomes: is it permissible to do away with mistaken or foolish customs. There is certainly a desire to maintain and preserve old customs. Ask me why I cut the ends of the brisket off before I cook it, or should you stand or remain seated when reciting the *Sh'ma*, or why do people getting an aliyah in that certain congregation in Chelm, always dip down by bending their knees when approaching the bimah.

Other reasons given for allowing kitniyot during Passover is that its prohibition detracts from the joy of the holiday by limiting permitted foods. It also creates an un-needed division between Ashkenazim and Sephardim in Israel.

#### \* \*

As for maintaining the restriction, it should be noted that the teshuva was originally meant to apply to those (Ashkenazim) living in Israel. Honoring and maintaining custom (minhag) is a longstanding and strong tradition of ours. We continue to celebrate Passover & Shavuot for eight days while in Israel, as in the Torah, they are observed for only seven days. We observe two days for Rosh Hashanah and Shavuot; in Israel only one.

The spring series began on Monday, March 12, 2018. The lecturer was Professor Michael D'Innocenzo, Distinguished Professor Emeritus, Hofstra University. - A sensational not-to-be-missed Sunday Brunch


To put all of this together=== on an annual basis takes about 10 months of dedication (visiting the many eateries and oft times countless re-visitations)

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## Marching Toward Liberation

Passover reminds us to fight oppression | By Lizz Goldstein

"Standing on the parted shores, we still believe what we were taught before ever we stood at Sinai's foot; that wherever we go, it is eternally Egypt; that there is a better place, a promised land; that the winding way to that promise passes through the wilderness. That there is no way to get from here to there except by joining hands, marching together."

—Mishkan T'filah, a Reform prayer book, adapted from Michael Walzer's Exodus and Revolution

Moses told the enslaved Israelites that God "will bring you to the land" as He swore to their ancestors (Exodus 6:8). Despite that promise, neither Moses nor most of the generation he led out of Egypt ever entered the Promised Land. And when we sit down to the first seder on the evening of March 30, we won't find this promise in the Haggadah. Indeed, the Torah itself ends with a new generation on the precipice. Why is there no happy ending to our formative text?

Perhaps it is because spiritually speaking, we—Jews and all of humankind—are still in the wilderness, not yet fully liberated. Though the ancient Israelites eventually reached the Land of Israel, today, many generations later, we see that oppression and hatred of the other remain potent and destructive.

We have seen many tragic examples of this in the United States over the past year, including last August when

torch-carrying white supremacists marched in Charlottesville, Va. I was there to join like-minded friends and colleagues in an interfaith-led counterprotest, organized by the local group Congregate Charlottesville. What I saw there shocked and frightened me: neo-Nazis marching proudly with swastika banners. And even though Virginia, where I live, is an opencarry state, it marked the first time I saw people holding assault rifles.

In the weeks that followed, people of different faiths-Christian, Muslim, Jewish—came together to raise their voices for equality and justice. I spoke at a vigil in Washington, D.C. I followed Defend C'ville's Twitter account to keep abreast of solidarity events that took place in Durham, N.C., Boston and New York City, where groups such as Black Lives Matter, the pro-immigrant Movimiento Cosecha and SURJ (Showing Up for Racial Justice, a white pro-justice movement) participated, essentially sending the message that "Our love is greater than your fear." The response was beautiful in its spontaneity and earnestness. It is a shame we only seem to come together in the face of tragedy. What might we accomplish if these group leaders maintained contact as well as a presence in the media in order to continue to advocate for safety to Jews, Muslims, people of color, queer people—all those subject to bigotry.

Before the Charlottesville rally, I read an article by longtime civil rights strategist Eric K. Ward, "Skin in the Game: How Antisemitism Animates White Supremacy," in The Public Eye, a publication of Political Research Associates. Ward, who is black, points out that many anti-racist activists don't take anti-Semitism seriously. It is crucial, he wrote, to "recognize that antisemitism is not a sideshow to racism within white nationalist thought.... [It is the] fuel that white nationalist ideology uses to power its anti-black racism, its contempt for other people of color...."

Ward's observations are a cogent footnote to American history: In the nearly 250 years since the United States was founded, anti-Semitism and other forms of discrimination have not yet been eliminated. But then it also took God 200 years to heed the groaning of the Hebrews and bring them out of slavery and into Israel.

As Jews celebrate our redemption from Egypt, we should also remember that hatred and bias still have not been eradicated from the world. And in philosopher Michael Walzer's words, there is only one way to leave the wilderness: "by joining hands, marching together."
